Built around the turn of the 20th century, 812 West Main Street is a two-story, free-standing,

side-gabled house constructed of frame with vinyl siding. It is arranged as a rectangle on a

relative north-south axis. It sits over a basement and encloses approximately 1,072 square feet.

The house stands near the north edge of the property line and back from the street. Its backyard

is populated with a few plantings and a manufactured shed. Its interior is updated, including a

reconfiguration of rooms.

Likely constructed in 1904, the two-story frame side-gabled house was acquired the same year

by Harriet Hill, an African American woman. Harriet and her husband David Hill lived in the

home, which formed a small Black cluster neighborhood along West Main Street, until the late

1910s. Improvements to the house, including its full façade porch, were made during their

ownership. The African American cluster soon disappeared, with only the neighboring Downey

family, staying beyond 1920. Unlike Emmitsburg's Lincoln Avenue African American

neighborhood, the West Main Street cluster did not sustain. Still, the Black-associated homes

are important for reflecting African American settlement in northern Frederick County. For this

reason, 812 West Main Street is recommended as a Contributing resource to the Emmitsburg

Historic District, eligible for Criterion A, Ethnic, Black History, at the local level of significance.

# **Summary**

Built around the turn of the 20th century, 812 West Main Street is a two-story, free-standing, side-gabled house constructed of frame with vinyl siding. It is arranged as a rectangle on a relative north-south axis. It sits over a basement and encloses approximately 1,072 square feet. The house stands near the north edge of the property line and back from the street. Its backyard is populated with a few plantings and a manufactured shed. Its interior is updated, including a reconfiguration of rooms.

# **Setting**

Historically associated with African American owner Harriet Hill, the house is situated near the traditional west end of the settlement of Emmitsburg, Frederick County. This area was the stopping point of Emmitsburg's historic settlement. Adjacent houses are free-standing and have more room than similar buildings in the downtown core. These residences, however, are still set close to the street, reflecting a historic pattern. A narrow alley runs behind the house, and beyond is a shallow tributary of Flat Run. The alley is populated with a few historic outbuildings, including wood-frame stables. Past the willow-lined stream are former farm fields, recently converted into a residential tract.

### **Building**

The home's principal (west) façade shows a traditional three-bay composition (Photo 1). The ground floor, protected by a porch, has an off-centered entry holding a modern ½-light door. The entrance is flanked by large windows consisting of vinyl, 1/1 sash, bracketed with narrow, decorative shutters. The porch components reveal no original material. The windows on the second story follow the same pattern as the ground level.

The south side of the home opens to a wood deck and reveals its development. The short elevation of the side-gabled portion has one window per floor (Photo 2). These are arranged vertically near the elevation's west edge and are the same type of windows and shutters found on the façade. The second half of the elevation consists of a lower, two-story volume (Photo 3). Based on Sanborn Fire Insurance maps, it began at a one-story height and increased to its current configuration before 1924 (Figure 6). Appended to this is a small, one-story, shed-roof extension. Premised on Sanborn maps, this feature was added by 1945 (Figure 7).

The east elevation looks over the backyard with a modern combination window at the kitchen (Photo 4).

The pre-1924 look of the house is maintained on the north elevation (Photo 1). The simple façade is penetrated by three windows, which appear to be in their original position. Here, too, a stone foundation is visible. Composed of blue-green metamorphized basalt, it reaches a height of roughly 34" above grade at the northeast corner.

The house is clad in gray German vinyl siding. The siding came with a new soffit system and likely introduced the current windows and shutters. The side-gabled portion of the house has "Victorian" patterned metal roofing shingles of recent vintage.

# Integrity

The house retains a sufficient degree of historic integrity, especially from the public view, to communicate the period of its African American ownership. The major changes, involving a height increase of the back portion, probably occurred during or soon after Harriet Hill's ownership. Other changes, namely the installation of vinyl siding and replacement, are ubiquitous and do not affect the building's overall plan, design, and appearance.

# Summary

9 Significance

### **Historical Overview**

Historically located at the far west extent of Emmitsburg, the area along the Waynesboro Road saw little development beyond the National Hotel, an informal demarcation of the west end of town. The name of the alley behind the house, Tannery Drive, reflects its early use. Opened in the late 18th century, the tanyard continued to operate until its third owner, Jacob Motter, shut it down in 1880. The tannery and its beam house are depicted on the 1873 atlas map for Frederick County as a large L-shaped building (Figure 2). Tanneries were typically located on the outskirts of town, on less valuable land. The treating of hides, and the odor they created, relegated them to less populated areas.

With the closure of the tannery and selling of lots from Jacob Motter's property, residential development in Emmitsburg began to shift west. This development coincided with the Shield's Addition, a large area making up Emmitsburg's "west end." In 1787, William Shield purchased 106 acres from William Emmit, who had platted the town only two years earlier. Emmit created a grid of town lots, divided into quadrants by a principal intersection. The plan resulted in a linear community, with Main Street experiencing the main growth. North and south of this principal artery were smaller alleys, which initially saw little development.

The subject area was platted in 1877 by John S. Shields, and sold to Isaac S. Annan, a prominent Emmitsburg merchant and banker, and his brother. Based on deed transactions, the subject lot was later part of a lumberyard. The 1890 Sanborn Fire Insurance map, the first to cover the area, does not indicate the presence of the house (Figure 3). The site was an undeveloped lot.

In 1904, Annan sold the property to John T. Florence, a white carpenter.<sup>2</sup> Florence likely built the house that year before selling it to Harriet Hill, a 56-year-old Black woman.<sup>3</sup> The dwelling appeared on the 1904 Sanborn map (Figure 4).

Hill was one of three Black residents who formed a short-lived African American cluster along West Main Street in the early 20th century. Born in Pennsylvania in 1847, Harriet married David Hill, a Maryland native five years her senior around 1874. The 1900 federal census documented the couple living in Emmitsburg's Precinct 1, surrounded by white homeowners.<sup>4</sup> Their household included three children – Stella, Charles, and David – all in their teens. David Sr. worked as a farm manager.

The 1910 census places David and Harriet Hill on West Main Street. By this time, they were of retirement age: David, 70, Harriet, 65. Yet David still worked doing "odd jobs." They lived alone but were surrounded by two other Black families making up a small African American community. A younger widowed Black man, George W. Abey (sometimes Aby), lived to the south with his seven children. On the other side was a renter named Hettie Parker — an older Black woman whose house is a subject of another survey.

Based on the Sanborn map of the same year, the Hill house had gained a full façade front porch (Figure 5). Missed in the next census, it is unclear what happened to David and Harriet Hill. It is assumed, given their age, that they died within that decade.

Like Hettie Parker's daughter, one of the Hill's children had moved to Monmouth County, New Jersey. During World War I, New Jersey and its host of war-related industries attracted Blacks from throughout the South, who moved to the state for better-paying jobs. By 1930, New Jersey's African American population had nearly tripled compared with before the war.<sup>6</sup>

In 1919, Ambrose Hill, the executor of Harriet's estate, transferred the West Main Street property to Joseph Francis Kreitz, a young house painter who was already living on the street. <sup>7</sup> At this point, the land went out of Black ownership.

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### Conclusion

The African American cluster of homes on West Main Street disappeared in the early part of the 20th century, with only the Downey family, who had purchased Hettie Parker's house, remaining. Unlike the Lincoln Avenue African American neighborhood, it did not sustain itself. Still, the two Black-associated homes are important and should be recognized.

For this reason, 812 West Main Street is recommended as a Contributing resource to the Emmitsburg Historic District, eligible for Criterion A, Ethnic, Black History, at the local level of significance.




Figure 1: Survey Boundary Map.




Figure 1B: Survey Boundary Map (1:12,000).




Figure 2: Emmitsburg, 1873 Atlas of Frederick County Maryland. Tannery circled.




Figure 3: 1890 Emmitsburg Sanborn Fire Insurance Map. Red rectangle indicates location of future house.




Figure 4: 1904 Emmitsburg Sanborn Fire Insurance Map. House present with one-story porch across south elevation.




Figure 5: 1910 Emmitsburg Sanborn Fire Insurance Map. House present with one-story porch added to west elevation.




Figure 6: 1924 Emmitsburg Sanborn Fire Insurance Map.




Figure 7: 1945 Emmitsburg Sanborn Fire Insurance Map.
